Assistance Program

As you may be aware, I submit the report for the assistance program approximately a month later because obviously when the newsletter is being done there are still assistance days left in the month. So, here is the end of year report for the assistance program.

I want to start off by reminding everyone that our program is open to ALL Shelby County residents. Financial assistance is available once in a 12-month time frame per household. Funds are available on a first come first served basis and the maximum amount we can assist with fluctuates based on funds available. Our goal is to help people in our community in the best way possible. Centenary helps with necessary utilities electric, gas, water. Or rental assistance, we do not cover a full month we do not have the funds for that. In 2023 we received 197 applications for assistance of those we were able to help 135 of those households affecting 327 individuals. At a total cost of \$19,237.97. If, for any reason, we are unable to assist someone with their request, I make an effort to refer them to other programs or agencies that might better meet their needs.

Each household can pick up food assistance once every other week. In 2023 Centenary handed out 1,728 bags of food feeding 3,651 individuals in our community. Centenary partners with Dare to Care, and most of the distributed food is donated. We received 25,723lbs of food from Dare to Care last year with an estimated value of \$39,870.65. We also received several hundred pounds of ground beef from Farmers Feeding Families along with a \$8,000.00 grant to help with food assistance. Shelby County ROTARY that meets here at the church on Tuesdays donated \$1,500.00 as well. Centenary does purchase some of the food that is distributed so that the bags have some of the same basic foods regularly. Those items are cereal, noodles, crackers or tortillas, beans or a source of protein, mac & cheese, and vegetables. Additional items are added depending on what is donated. Along with the pantry bag we also hand out frozen meats or refrigerated items like milk, eggs, and cheese if we have them. Centenary spent \$7,615.76 on food and supplies for the assistance program last year. The total of donated and purchased food was around \$47,807.91 for the food assistance program last year.

The total funds spent on food and financial assistance in 2023 were \$27,175.03. This program is 100% run by donations of funds and food. The program would not be possible if not for the generosity of our congregation and community partners so thank you for helping your neighbors.

Ramp Ministry Update

The new 2024 year is off to a busy start for our Ramp Ministry. This is an update on both the current requests we have for ramps, and a report on the first ramp installation of 2024 (completed in January).

Already this year we have received three requests for ramps. Two of these will be scheduled for a later date. Of these, one of them is for a member of our church family and will be built when she is ready to move to a new home. The second ramp is for a lady who currently uses a walker and has assistance in entering and leaving her home, but a ramp is needed. We will build this one later, as the weather permits since she has assistance. The third ramp was for a more urgent need, so we rushed to complete this ramp in January before the cold weather moved in.

This third ramp is for a 74-year-old gentleman living in the eastern part of the county, past Defoe and almost to the Franklin County line. This is actually the second time we have built a ramp at this home, as we built a ramp for his wife last summer. She was wheelchair bound due to COPD, lung cancer, and other health issues. When we received the request last year, she was in the hospital and looking to be discharged. After we put the ramp up, she was discharged, but she only made use of the ramp one time. When we received the call that the ramp was no longer needed, I (David) believe I was told she came home on a Friday and passed away on Sunday. The family was appreciative that they were able to get her back into her home for even this short a time. We removed the ramp for future use somewhere else.

Now the ramp is needed back at this home. Just before Christmas I received a call from the daughter requesting a ramp for her father. On December 16th, he was in his barn and fell off a ladder. He broke both legs when he fell and since he lives alone, it was almost eight hours before they found him. He was in the hospital and was facing surgery to repair both legs and time at a rehab facility. On January 4th, when I spoke to his daughter the surgery was completed and the doctor said he would probably be discharged to Fraizer Rehab for approximately two or three weeks. He will be in a non-weight-bearing situation for some time as the healing takes place. Looking at the long-range weather forecast, January 8th & 11th were going to be the best days to work outside for quite a while. On Monday, January 8th, a small team met at the storage facility provided by Patty Burks to prepare and load the ramp sections. Then on Thursday, January 11th, another small team met and completed installation of the ramp.

With all the cold temperatures, heavy or drizzly rains, and snow that we have seen at the start of this year, we were blessed to have two days that were good days to work outside. We thank God for the good weather and the resources He continues to provide for this Ramp Ministry as we reach out to our neighbors in His name. We also thank you, our church family, for your continued support of and many prayers lifted for this Ramp Ministry.

Our guiding scripture verse is this:

"You obey the law of Christ when you offer each other a helping hand." - Galatians 6:2 (CEV)

As always, all volunteers are welcome to join us on future ramp builds. We have a lot of fun while we work and we get to know more about our fellow team members. There are tasks for every skill set...and no special skills are required. We carry a lot less lumber than we used to carry since many of the ramps we install now are the aluminum ramps. We have tools available for everyone to use and we will show you how to use them. At the ramp preparation day on January 8th, Trisha even learned a new trick for tightening the nuts on the slider inserts for the handrails and legs of the aluminum ramp sections WHEN WEARING HEAVY GLOVES for the cold weather. We have multiple power screwdrivers, some with depth-setters so that you can't accidentally countersink the screws. If you don't like power tools...we often need help with shovels, a pick, a tamper, and the wheelbarrow. If that sounds like too much manual labor, we would welcome for a couple of people to make themselves available during ramp builds to simply sit and visit with our neighbor receiving the ramp. On larger ramp builds, we may take a break to enjoy a meal or snack. We also deeply appreciate our faithful prayer warriors. We ask that if you are unable to be present with us at a ramp build that you please keep our recipients, our workers, and our ministry in your prayers.

We look forward to having more new faces join us for great fellowship as we work together to minister to our neighbors. Each of our team members can share stories of how they have been blessed to be a part of this ministry, so we know you will be blessed through your participation as well.







