

2 Corinthians 5:17 So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; look, new things have come into being! (NRSVUE)

We are generally a people of waiting. We wait for Christmas, we wait for Easter Sunday, we wait for the next potluck, we wait for the coming Kingdom of God and the restoration of all creation. With all this talk of waiting, it can be easy to think that the Christian life is simply about waiting for something to happen in the future, instead of an experience of new life right now.

I can remember a time when I thought of new creation as something that happens in the future. It was this idea that we are just supposed to avoid sinning as much as possible and wait until heaven – do the best we can and then hope we did well enough to punch our ticket to the other side. There was little talk of living a transformed life right now.

But that's not what Paul writes to the church at Corinth. Instead, he says, if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation. He doesn't say, "there will be new creation in some distant future", but that there is new creation right here and now. Jesus' resurrection was not only for himself, but for all of us. As a follower of Jesus, you are a new creation. Something new has happened and is happening with in you – the Spirit is working to bring wholeness, life, and new creation in your life. We are invited to do so much more than avoid sinning, we are called to live transformed lives right here and now.

This, of course, is a process. New creation takes time to grow. This is part of why we have so many opportunities to wait in the Christian year. These are times we patiently allow the Spirit to work within us, to deal with sin, and be ready for new life.

So, friends, as we see signs of Spring sprouting up around us, let us also be reminded of the new creation that is happening within us. It's not something we have to wait for, it's something we get to embrace and live right here and now. We get to live a bit of resurrection each day.



Assistance Program

This program has helped so many people over the few years I have been with you all at Centenary. The program has grown and changed to meet the needs of our neighbors. And while Centenary has done it's best to answer those calls for help, we cannot always be the answer. The assistance program is very low on funding. I have said this before, and it is still holding true today. Just recently we received notice that we would not be receiving anything from the Dare to Care grant that was applied for earlier this year. Dare to Care covers several counties in Kentucky and Southern Indiana. I can only guess at how many applications they had received. While we can understand not getting this grant it is disheartening, because we really need the funds to keep this program going. The rising food costs have not only impacted us as far as cost spent on food purchased; but caused more people to come to us for food. As explained last month that in 2022 our numbers doubled from 2021. In February this year Centenary handed out 141 bags of food feeding 288 people. Last year the January and February total number of bags was 145 for two months! Think about that for a moment, this year we are serving the same number of Households in one month that we did in two at the beginning of last year. March last year was when we saw a huge jump in people coming in. Those numbers continue to run high, and we are seeing new people all the time. To help cut costs last year some food items were removed from the list of items we bought to be included in the bags. Those items were things people normally get from every food pantry and start piling up after a time. We continue to receive donation from Dare to Care weekly, but the amount has dropped drastically. Last year in January and February we received on average 591lbs of food from Dare to Care. This year for January and February we averaged 374lbs that is about 63% of what we were getting at this time last year. We do have another grant application in for the Farmers Feeding Families grant through Metro United Way. Please pray that we are awarded funds from that program to help keep this program running at the level it currently is.

As for financial assistance we continue to help people the bast that we can as well. Amounts have been adjusted as needed to allow Centenary to help as many people as possible with the funds available. In February we received 10 applications for assistance, and we were able to assist 6 of those applicants and their families affecting 18 people for a total cost of \$600.00. The others that were not assisted were either not eligible because we had already assisted them within the past 12 months, or they did not come back with the required paperwork. We strive to help everyone to the best of our ability even if it is a referral to another organization for assistance. Many other organizations are also having the same problem we are a lack of funding to meet the requests for help. I ask that you all please pray for the people that are seeking help, pray for the organizations and programs that try to help and please pray for the people that are on the front lines that handle these requests.

The celebration of resurrection on Easter morning holds vastly deeper meaning and joy when we have walked through the events leading up to it. Join us again on Easter Sunday to share in that joy!



Ramp Ministry

The Ramp Ministry is already at work this year as we serve others in our community. This year we have received five requests for ramp information. Two of these are from other churches asking for assistance with what they might need to make their building more accessible. While we do not build ramps for organizations, we did meet them to share information. One request was from a grandmother who provides after school care for her 11-year-old granddaughter. They were carrying her granddaughter up the steps, but this was getting to be difficult to accomplish. The ramp was needed in her garage, with the limited workspace, a small group of our ramp building team provided this much needed ramp.





We have two ramp requests that have been assessed and we will be completing them during the month of April.

One of these is for a gentleman in Eminence with a power chair. As you will notice in the picture the step up is only about 6 inches, but this creates a barrier where he is unable to get his chair out of his home. This is a short rise, but we will be providing 27 feet of ramp to get him across his yard to his driveway

The other ramp is for a lady in Bullitt County. She currently has a wooden ramp that is no longer useable for her. She has a power chair, and this ramp is rotten to the point of no longer supporting her power chair. We will be replacing this ramp with new materials.

If you are not a member of the Ramp Ministry and would like to be please contact me through the church office. You do not need any special skills, just a willing heart to serve. We have opportunities for workers both during the week and on weekends. So, there is a place for you in this ministry.

The Redwoods Group



Our Centenary Redwoods Group was planted as a result of the "40 Days of Community" small groups study held while Reverend Lowell Ogden was here (1999 – 2004). Members broke into small groups to make a difference through prayer and service. Duanne Puckett led a group of women who met in her home each month to adopt projects that would embrace opportunities to serve Christ. She introduced the name "Redwoods" which reflected the belief that members were like the giant redwood trees that thrive in thick groves where their roots intertwine for support. We have adopted the name and our logo shows the redwood trees as we feel this symbolizes our intertwined mission to work together to serve Christ. The scripture passage that serves as our motto is:

...and I pray that Christ will make his home in your hearts through faith. I pray that you may have your roots and foundation in love, so that you, together with all God's people, may have the power to understand how broad and long, how high and deep is Christ's love.

Ephesians 3:17-18 (GNT)

Redwoods projects over the years have been numerous and varied. We've tackled church landscaping. We have hosted tea receptions in the fellowship hall when we've held dedications of the stained glass windows. We have polished the communion service set, filled food bags for the Dare to Care assistance program, and had several kitchen clean-up events over the years. The biggest undertaking for our group was in 2015 when a \$ 10,000 gift challenged us to remodel the fellowship hall and kitchen. Our Redwoods group does not only do service projects within the church though. We also hold outreach projects. Some of these outreach projects have included visits to local assisted living facilities with cookie trays and goodie bags, collecting needed clothing items and touring Colonial Hall Manor, and collecting books and monetary donations to take to the public library for Bug's Books. We have also collected clothes for the Northside Early Childhood Center where we have taken tours and assisted them in packing backpacks for summer development programs. A highlight last year was our visit to Redbird Mission in Beverly, Kentucky. We toured their school and other facilities, and took donations of both food and monetary gifts.

Our regular monthly Redwoods meetings are held the second Monday of each month, with the exception of January due to uncertain weather. We meet at 10:00 a.m. in the fellowship hall. During our meetings, we will have a devotional presented by one of our members, listen to other personal reflections, and sign cards for persons on our hearts (shut-in members of our church, people having surgery or recovering from illness...whomever God has put on our hearts as needing a bit of cheer and extra prayer). We will also have a brief time for business to plan our future activities before we hold our service project or leave for our tour/visit. Many of us will gather together following the meeting for more time of fellowship over lunch. We have also recently begun to assist in delivering the "hug quilts" that our quilters are still making.

We have nine focal areas for projects...some within Centenary and many outside in our community and further into the state. Planning is happening now for where we want to tour and help this year.

Our group of ladies is always ready to welcome new members, so please consider joining us at our April meeting. We are hosting a membership tea that morning. We will meet on Monday, April 10, 2023 at 10:00 a.m. in the fellowship hall. As we were planning our April tea, one member shared the following thoughts, "We are most excited about our tea for perspective members and encourage you to become a part of this group. Helping others adds a sense of satisfaction to life that few other experiences can provide. When we reach out to others, we feel an interconnectedness with all of life - a kinship, and a sense of community. Please join us. We need you!!!" Please join us and become a part of this women's ministry.


